Admission Requirements

Admission is based on the following criteria.

- ◆ Completion of High School or equivalent
- ◆ Minimum cumulative & prerequisite GPA of 3.0 in college courses
- ◆ College prerequisites with a “C” or better
- ◆ Application with personal essay
- ◆ Pre-entrance exams (*TEAS & CA Academic Press*)
- ◆ Letters of Recommendation (3)
- ◆ Qualified applicants will be invited to interview

Prerequisites

- ◆ Intermediate Algebra (*or high school Algebra II*)*
- ◆ Intro to Physics (*or high school Physics*)*
- ◆ Anatomy & Physiology I
- ◆ Anatomy & Physiology II
- ◆ Intro to Organic Chemistry*
- ◆ Intro to Bio. Chemistry*
- ◆ Basic Medical Microbiology
- ◆ Public Speaking
- ◆ Freshman English (*1 year*)
- ◆ General Psychology
- ◆ Intro to Sociology
- ◆ Physical Education (*2 activity classes*)
- ◆ Humanities (*16 units - including a foreign language*)
- * Differs for Currently Licensed RNs

To Apply to Loma Linda University’s School of Nursing, students must be in the process of completing all prerequisite courses. Before enrolling in the program, students must first meet all the admission requirements. The application can be found online at www.llu.edu/apply.

Application Deadlines are important and must be followed. The School of Nursing accepts students three times a year. Students completing their last prerequisites, who meet all admission requirements, can apply for the next open term. Students should have completed the entire application process by these deadlines:

- ◆ March 31 - *Fall quarter*
- ◆ September 1 - *Winter quarter*
- ◆ December 1 - *Spring quarter*

Financial Aid is available for eligible students. You should begin your financial aid process in January of the year you plan to attend. Even before acceptance into the program, it’s a good idea to apply early for financial assistance. Applications for Cal Grants (California Residents only) must be postmarked no later than March 2. The **School of Nursing** offers the Bachelor of Science (B.S.), the Master's of Science (M.S.), and the Doctorate of Philosophy (Ph.D.). Advance placement tracks are also available. For working nurses, courses are offered during late afternoons and evenings and are available for part-time study.

The types of tracks offered in the undergraduate department are:

- ◆ Basic BS Program
- ◆ BA/BS to BS Track - *for those with a Baccalaureate degree in another area*
- ◆ Accelerated MS Track - *for those with a Baccalaureate degree in another area*
- ◆ LVN to BS Track - *for LVNs with a license in CA*
- ◆ RN to BS Track - *for RNs with a license in CA*
- ◆ RN to BS/MS Track - *for RNs with a license in CA & a minimum of 3 years experience*

The B.S. degree prepares students for professional nursing in acute and community settings. Length of the program is dependent on which track students attend. Exact track information can be found on the School of Nursing website.

Loma Linda University Medical Center, located across the street from the School of Nursing, is an approximately 900 bed tertiary-care teaching hospital, including the Children's Hospital, the Loma Linda University Community Medical Center, and the Behavioral Medical Center. The Medical Center is the site for many of the clinical experiences, internships, and educational opportunities available to students at Loma Linda University.

As a level one regional trauma and health care center, Loma Linda University Medical Center operates some of the largest clinical programs in the United States in areas such as neonatal care and outpatient surgery, and is recognized as the international leader in infant heart transplantation and proton treatments for cancer.
